Mission

THE MISSION OF THE CENTRE FOR RESEARCH IN ETHICS IS TO CONTRIBUTE TO THE ADVANCEMENT OF KNOWLEDGE AND THE QUALITY OF TRAINING IN THE FIELD OF ETHICS

In a broad sense, ethics includes the study of the foundations of this discipline and its main concepts, as well as the study of the normative dimensions of public policies and social practices in areas such as health, management of the natural and human environment, trade, and social and cultural diversity.

The Centre is a place for researchers from its affiliated universities and schools to come together and create synergies. At the same time, it is a place of excellence for the supervision of graduate students and postdoctoral fellows working on research topics related to the Centre's mission.

The Centre fosters national and international collaborations. It establishes partnerships with professional bodies and relevant government organisations. It ensures that the results of the research produced under its auspices are used to guide debates in civil society and to advise political decision-making.

The Centre de Recherche en Éthique / Centre for Research in Ethics (CRÉ), which was created in May 2014, is the direct successor of the Centre de Recherche en Éthique de l'Université de Montréal (CRÉUM), a centre that had been directed from its inception in 2002 until the end of August 2011 by Daniel Weinstock. Bryn Williams-Jones then took over and assumed the role of Director until the end of the year. In January 2012, Christine Tappolet was appointed Director of the CRÉUM. Under her leadership, the CRÉUM was awarded a Regroupement Stratégique grant from the FRQ-SC and was transformed into an inter-university centre, adopting the name of Centre de Recherche en Éthique. In November 2019, it submitted an application to the FRQ to renew the grant, which was accepted in April 2020 and provides the centre with FRQ-SC/FRQS funding until spring 2026.

Having reached the end of the last mandate that the centre's statutes allowed her to assume, Christine Tappolet left the management of the CRÉ in December 2021. Ryoa Chung and Kristin Voigt have been invited by the CRÉ Board of Directors to take over and co-lead the centre, effective January 1, 2022.

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A word from the co-directors

Dear all,

The year 2022-2023 was rich in changes and scientific activities at the Centre de recherche en éthique/Centre for Research in Ethics, which brings together 72 co-researchers from seven Quebec universities and CEGEPs. On January 1, 2022, Ryoa Chung (UdeM) and Kristin Voigt (McGill) began their terms as co-directors of the CRÉ and Valéry Giroux was appointed as Assistant Director. Éliot Litalien was also hired to coordinate the CRÉ and the journal Les Ateliers de l'éthique/The Ethics Forum. Martin Gibert, a researcher in the ethics of artificial intelligence, is the scientific liaison between the CRÉ and the Institute for Data Valorization (IVADO).

The management team would like to thank the colleagues co-responsible for the five research axes for their invaluable contribution: Mauro Rossi (UQÀM) and Natalie Stoljar (McGill) for the *Fundamental Ethics axis*, Christian Nadeau (UdeM) and Pablo Gilabert (Concordia) for the *Ethics and Politics axis*, Dominic Martin (UQÀM) and Denise Celentano (UdeM) for the *Ethics and Economics axis*, Kristin Voigt (McGill) and Antoine C. Dussault (Cégep Lionel-Groulx) for the *Ethics and Environment axis*, Vardit Ravitsky (UdeM) and Daniel Weinstock (McGill) for the *Ethics and Health axis*.

In addition, the three flagship research themes at the CRÉ were led by Dominic Martin (UQÀM), assisted by Martin Gibert (CRÉ/IVADO) in *Ethics of Artificial Intelligence*, by Naïma Hamrouni (UQTR) and Ryoa Chung (UdeM) in *Feminist Ethics*, and Yann Allard-Tremblay (McGill) for the flagship theme *Antiracism and Decolonization*.

The CRÉ's 2022-2023 scientific program has attracted many international luminaries as participants and invited speakers. We warmly thank them for these valuable collaborative ties that contribute to the international influence of the CRÉ. However, we would like to emphasize the involvement of our members, which is essential to the scientific vitality of the centre.

The major symposium "Sovereignty, Autonomy and Multinational Federalism" (September 18-20, 2022) organized by Xavier Boileau (PhD student, UdeM) assisted by Ryoa Chung (UdeM), Marc-Antoine Dilhac (UdeM), Daniel Weinstock (McGill) and funded by a SSHRC Connection grant, during which 11 of the 16 presentations were given by CRÉ co-investigators, kicked off the year's scientific activities.

Among the events that marked 2022-2023, the conference "Race and Epistemologies of Ignorance" (April 24-26, 2023) launched by the main lecture given by Luvell Anderson (Syracuse University) was organized by postdoctoral researcher Saaz Taher whom we thank and congratulate warmly for this success. The conference was well attended and featured talks from our members Amandine Catala (UQÀM), Yann Allard-Tremblay (McGill), Agnès Berthelot-Raffard (York U.) and Ryoa Chung (UdeM).

In the wake of the Covid-19 pandemic that has raised so many ethical issues, the workshop "Vaccine Hesitancy: Science and Society" around the work of Maya Goldenberg (Guelph) was held at McGill on April 27, 2023. This study day, which was attended by our members Anne-Marie Gagné-Julien (CRÉ postdoc), Fernanda Pérez-Gay Juarez (CRÉ postdoc), Ian Gold (McGill), Kristin Voigt (McGill), Matthew Hunt (McGill), Luc Faucher (UQÀM) and Daniel Weinstock (McGill), was organized by Ryoa Chung (UdeM) in collaboration with Matthew Hunt, Director of the Ethics Axis of the Quebec Population Health Research Network.

CRÉ researchers develop cutting-edge research on current issues. Our members Didier Zuniga (CRÉ postdoc), Catherine Lu (McGill), Yann Allard-Tremblay (McGill) participated in the colloquium "Transcending Settler Colonialism: Decolonization, Reconciliation, and Transformation" (May 26-27), organized by the Lin Center at McGill with the participation of the CRÉ.

Our members were numerous at the 3-day international workshop (August 15-17, 2022) entitled "Power and Domination", with Arash Abizadeh (McGill), Dominique Leydet (UQÀM), Éliot Litalien (postdoc, CRÉ), Pablo Gilabert (Concordia), William Clare Roberts (McGill), Yann Allard-Tremblay (McGill), Daniel Marc Weinstock (McGill).

The CRÉ also establishes links between academia and the media. For example, science journalists Matthieu Dugal and Marie Lambert-Chan participated in the "Science, Media & Democracy" conference, held on June 22, 2022, organized by Ryoa Chung (CRÉ) and Matthew Hunt (Quebec

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Population Health Research Network) with the participation of our members Jocelyn Maclure (McGill), Vardit Ravitsky (UdeM) and Daniel Weinstock (McGill).


Issues related to feminist and gender studies are also highlighted at the CRÉ, in particular during the symposium "Rethinking Consent" (October 12-13, 2022) around the work of Manon Garcia (Berlin), organized by Naïma Hamrouni (UQTR) with Amandine Catala (UQÀM), Lila Braunschweig (postdoc, CRÉ), Anne Iavarone-Turcotte (postdoc, CRÉ), Cécile Gagnon (PhD, UdeM) and Marie-Anne Perreault (Master, UdeM).

A significant concentration of researchers who work on the ethical issues of artificial intelligence is gathered at the CRÉ. The 4th CRÉ/OBVIA day in AI ethics (February 3, 2023), organized by Hazar Haidar (UQAR) and Martin Gibert (CRÉ/OBVIA), on the theme of affective computing, brought together 12 external speakers and 4 members of the CRÉ – Martin Gibert (CRÉ/OBVIA); Dominic Martin (UQÀM); Joé Martineau (HEC); and Thomas Adetou (student member of the CRÉ).

Of course, these activities represent only a fraction of all the scientific events organized by the CRÉ or in which the center's researchers have participated. The year 2022-2023 was marked by the arrival of a new team at the head of the CRÉ which, for the first time, is co-led by two directors from UdM and McGill. These changes underscore the importance of inter-university collaborations that nurture this strategic cluster supported by the FRQSC, which we would like to thank for the increased funding.

As co-directors, we were supported by the essential expertise of Assistant Director Valéry Giroux and by the remarkable efficiency of Éliot Litalien, Martin Gibert and Guillaume Soucy. Above all, we were thrilled by the dynamism and academic effervescence of our post-doctoral researchers. We would like to congratulate them all for their accomplishments during their time at the CRÉ. We wish good luck to those who obtained their professorships during their fellowship at the CRÉ in 2022-2023, Didier Zúñiga (Assistant Professor, Alberta), Lila Braunschweig (Assistant Professor, Utrecht), Laura Silva (Assistant Professor, Laval) and Jules Salomone-Sehr who obtained a Career Development Fellowship in Philosophy at Oxford.

Organizational Structure

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS is composed of the Director(s) of the CRÉ; 3 Vice-Presidents or their représentantive (Frédéric Mégret, representing Martha Crago of McGill University; Donald Tremblay, representing Marie-Josée Hébert of the Université de Montréal; and 1 "rotating" representative, coming from one of the other affiliated institutions and elected for 2 years - Jean-Pierre Perreault from the Université de Sherbrooke); and 3 coresearchers from the CRÉ (Christine Tappolet from the Université de Montréal; Naïma Hamrouni of the Université du Québec à Trois-Rivières; and Juliette Roussin of Université Laval) elected for a 3-year term by the Assembly of Members and by the management. The function of the Board of Directors, which meets at least once a year and is chaired by one of the Vice-Presidents, is to ensure that the CRÉ fulfills its research and training mandate, and to appoint the Director(s) of the CRÉ.

THE COMMITTEE OF SCIENTIFIC EXPERTS is composed of 5 to 12 ethics researchers of international stature, mandated by the Board of Directors for a period of 6 years, renewable. They receive the annual activity report and are invited to take an external look at the Centre's research, transfer, and training activities, with the aim of making comments and recommendations on its main orientations. THE MEMBERS' ASSEMBLY is made up of all the centre's co-researchers. Employees are invited to participate, but do not have the right to vote. It is informed and consulted on a regular basis by electronic means and meets at least once a year. Its main function is to elect 3 representatives to the Board of Directors. The assembly also has an advisory function, with the director(s) reporting to the assembly for consultation. It is chaired by one of the co-researchers elected by their peers, Christian Nadeau, for a period of 3 years.

- The students of the CRÉ are graduate students who work under the supervision of a co-investigator of the Centre and whose work includes an ethical component.
- The Associate researchers are part of the research teams of the axes and regularly participate in their activities.
- Visiting researchers are not officially attached to the CRÉ, but they spend time at the physical sites of the centre and
 participate assiduously in its activities. These are often students coming to intern at the Center as part of their study
 abroad program.

Even if the central question of ethics is to know what to do in a necessarily particular context, it is crucial, in order to know how to answer it, to understand the concepts and the presuppositions around which they revolve. In order to advance reflection on the ethical issues of the different spheres of human activity, the projects in this axis aim to

ETHICS AND POLITICS

Acis directors: PABLO GILABERT and CHRISTIAN NADEAU

Focus Themes: Democracy, Justice, Institutions, Pluralism, Equality, Intersectionality, Social Transformation

The research carried out within this axis is structured around the evaluation of justice and the legitimacy of social institutions, understood as sets of rules allowing cooperation between individuals, at the national and international levels. The work consists of: (a) examining the founding concepts and arguments of contemporary political discourse and practice (freedom, equality, tolerance, deliberation, representation, etc.); and (b) study the deployment of these concepts in specific

institutional frameworks such as schools, healthcare systems, judicial institutions, etc. Our work is organized around four research projects that host transversal collaborations.

In economics, efficiency is presented as the first virtue of our institutions. It is generally accepted that this angle of analysis refrains from making value judgments. This is misleading. First, any efficiency analysis is based on

Ryoa Chung, Professor at the Department of Philosophy at the Université de Montréal. Prof.

Chung is the recipient of the 2005 FAS Excellence in Teaching Award (Arts and Humanities Sector). Holder of a doctoral internship diploma as a foreign scientific resident at the École Normale Supérieure de Fontenay/St-Cloud (Paris, 1997), she completed her doctorate in philosophy at the Université de Montréal (2001) under the supervision of Daniel M. Weinstock and completed two research stays as a visiting scholar at Columbia University (2002) and the Harvard School of Public Health (2003).

Her articles have appeared in journals such as Journal of Social Philosophy, Critical Review of International Social and Political Philosophy, Public Health Ethics, Revue internationale de sociologie, Canadian Journal of Philosophy, Medicine, Conflict and Survival (2017) as well as in collective works such as Questions d'éthique contemporaine (edited by L. Thiaw-Po-Une, Stock, 2006), and Bioethics in Canada (co-edited by C. Weijer, A. Skelton and S. Brennan, Oxford University Press, 2013). Ryoa Chung is also the author of the entries 'Soft Power' and 'Domination' in the Global Justice Encyclopedia (edited by D. Chatterjee, Springer, 2012). She is also the author of the entries 'Epistemic Injustices' and 'Health Inequalities' in the Dictionary of Inequalities and Social Justice (edited by P. Savidan, Presses universitaires de France, 2018).

With Matthew R. Hunt, she co-authored the chapter 'Justice and Health Inequalities in Humanitarian Crises. Structured Health Vulnerabilities and Natural Disasters' in Health Inequalities and Global Justice (P. T. Lenard and C. Straehle co-eds, Edinburgh University Press, 2012) and published papers with co-authors L. Eckenwiler and C. Straehle in Bioethics, with co-authors M. Johri, A. Dawson, T. Schrecker in Globalization and Health. She has also published in collaboration with Hunt, Durocher, Henrys, Rochon in the Journal of Medical Ethics (2017) and Journal of Human Rights Practice (2016). Ryoa Chung co-edited with Jean-Baptiste Jeangène Vilmer the book Éthique des relations internationales (Presses universitaires de France, 2013). Several accepted articles are to be published in 2019-2020. With Dr. Joanne Liu, former international president of Médecins Sans Frontières, Chung co-published an essay in Hastings Center Bioethics Forum. Together with members of an international research group funded by the Wellcome Trust, Ahmed, Chung, Eckenwiler and co. co-authored a paper published in The Lancet (2020). With L. Eckenwiler, N. Berlinger, R. Chung, A. Gotlib, V. Wild, D. Zion, she co-edited a collective work Forced Migration and Health Justice under contract for Oxford University Press.

Since 2017, R. Chung has been a regular contributor to "Les Éclaireurs", "Plus on Lit" and "Moteur de recherche" on Radio-Canada Ici Première and discusses social issues from the perspective of public ethics. She has given academic presentations in Canada, the United States, Haiti, France, Great Britain, Switzerland, Germany, India, Cameroon, Denmark, and Greece.

Chung is currently working on structural and epistemic injustices to better understand the production and perpetuation of health inequalities. She is also working on the notion of 'structural health vulnerability' (developed with M. Hunt, McGill) in relation to the refugee situation. She is currently a member of international research teams funded by the Quebec Population Health Network and the British Wellcome Trust Foundation (2018-2019). Her work was funded by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (research team 2011-2016) and is currently funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada SSHRC/Insight Development – Principal Investigator Research Team (2018-2022) and Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada SSHRC/Insight – Individual Project (2018-2023).



Kristin Voigt, Associate Professor at McGill University, jointly appointed in the Department of Philosophy and the Department of Equity, Ethics and Policy.

She received her DPhil in political philosophy from the University of Oxford in 2008, where she completed a dissertation on luck egalitarianism. From 2007-08, she worked as an Assistant Professor at the European College of Liberal Arts (now ECLA-Bard) in Berlin. Subsequently, she held research positions at Harvard University's Program in Ethics and Health (2008-10),

Lancaster University, UK (2010-11) and McGill University (2011-12), before becoming a faculty member at McGill in 2012.

Her research areas include political philosophy, especially egalitarian theories of social and distributive justice, normative aspects of social and health policy, public health ethics, including tobacco control, (childhood) obesity and the use of incentives to improve health outcomes, conceptions and measures of health and health inequality.

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR



Valéry Giroux, LL. M. and Ph.D. in philosophy, Université de Montréal

As Assistant Director of the Centre, Valéry performs administrative functions, project coordination, welcoming researchers and animating college life at the CRÉ. Valéry is also a member of the Research Group in Environmental and Animal Ethics (GRÉEA).

Her research focuses on animal ethics. In her doctoral dissertation (L'Âge d'Homme, 2017), she showed that the most fundamental human rights

should be granted to all sentient beings. She has conducted a seminar entirely devoted to animal ethics at the Université de Sherbrooke and taught an introductory ethics course at the Université de Montréal. In addition to coordinating the scientific activities of the CRÉ, she is now pursuing her research on veganism as a political movement (Le Véganisme, Puf, 2017 and "Véganisme", Encyclopédie philosophique 2016), on the legal status of animals ("Les autres animaux en droit", Revue du notariat, 2019) as well as on speciesism (L'Antispécisme, Puf, June 2020). She is a Fellow of the Oxford Centre for Animal Ethics and an Associate Professor at the Faculty of Law of the Université de Montréal. Finally, she co-supervises graduate students whose research projects focus on animal ethics.

COORDINATOR



Éliot Litalien, Ph.D. in philosophy, Centre de recherche en éthique

Éliot Litalien is the CRÉ's coordinator and the Les Ateliers de l'éthique/The Ethics Forum's editorial manager. He holds a PhD in philosophy from McGill University, which was completed under the supervision of Natalie Stoljar and Daniel Weinstock. Before joining the CRÉ, he occupied the positions of SSHRC postdoctoral fellow at the Australian National University and of Visiting Postdoctoral Research Associate at Princeton University's University Center for Human Values.

His central research interests are located at the intersection of moral philosophie, philosophy of action and social ontology. The main issues he explores have to do with the normative significance of both collective and individual agency. He is also interested in the significance of collective agency in epistemology and in relational theories of autonomy and equality.

RESEARCH AGENT: ETHICS OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE AND BIG DATA MANAGEMENT



Martin Gibert, Centre de recherche en éthique / IVADO

Since July 1, 2017, Martin has been a research officer at CRÉ and IVADO. He works on the issue of the ethics of AI and algorithms. In particular, he wonders how to program artificial moral agents (self-driving cars, chatbots, care robots).

His skills are generalist: he has taught numerous courses in normative and applied ethics, philosophy of law, and critical thinking. His doctoral and postdoctoral research focused on moral psychology. His publications include

the role of imagination in moral deliberation and our moral perception of non-human animals from an anti-speciesist perspective.

In the ethics of artificial intelligence, he is particularly interested in how to implement processes of moral deliberation in machines. He believes that a good model could be based on virtue ethics and moral perception, i.e., the stage of gathering relevant information that precedes moral reasoning and decision-making. Supervised learning seems to be a promising technology for such a project. Another of his areas of interest is the moral biases revealed by big data and how best to correct them.

He writes the blog: "La quatrième blessure " and published in May 2020 an introductory book on the ethics of algorithms, "Faire la morale aux robots " at Atelier10.

Axes Directors



Denise Celentano, Assistant Professor of Ethics and Political Philosophy, Université de Montréal. Since February 2023, she has been co-director of the *Ethics and Politics axis*.

Her main areas of research are contemporary political and social philosophy and applied ethics, with a focus on the philosophy of work and a particular attention to social inequalities and technological change. She is currently working on projects that link work philosophy and ethics technology, as well as a relational and egalitarian vision of labour relations. Her interests include topics on social and economic ethics, AI ethics, feminist theory, and social

theory.

She previously worked as an Assistant Professor of Ethics and Political Philosophy, with expertise in Philosophy of Technology, at Radboud University in the Netherlands (iHub on Digitalization and Society). Prior to that, she was a postdoctoral researcher at the Center for Research in Ethics and a Berggruen Postdoctoral Fellow in Philosophy at New York University.



Antoine C. Dussault, Professor of Philosophy at Collège Lionel-Groulx and Associate Professor at the Centre interuniversitaire de recherche sur la science et la technologie (CIRST). He co-directs the *Environmental and Animal Ethics axis*.

Before joining the CRÉ as a co-researcher, he completed a PhD in the Department of Philosophy at the Université de Montréal (dir. Christine Tappolet and Frédéric Bouchard) on the concept of ecosystem health and its relevance to environmental ethics, then a postdoctoral fellowship at the Institut d'histoire et de philosophie des sciences et des techniques (IHPST) of

the Université Paris I (dir. Philippe Huneman). He is also a founding member of the Research Group on Animal and Environmental Ethics (GRÉEA) and a member of the editorial board of the Canadian Journal of Environmental Philosophy (CIPE).

His research interests include environmental ethics, philosophy of ecology, and philosophy of medicine. In environmental ethics, he works mainly on the question of whether it is conceptually possible and ethically required to recognize a moral considerability of ecosystems. He is also interested in the question of the role of moral sentiments in the recognition of such a considerability and the conceptual issues raised by the concept(s) of intrinsic value. His work in the philosophy of ecology and

medicine aims in part to inform this work, notably by clarifying the concept of function associated with the idea of functional biodiversity, developing a definition of health that can be applied to both organisms and ecosystems, and determining the ontological status of ecosystems.



Pablo Gilabert, Professor, Department of Philosophy, Concordia University. He co-directs the *Ethics and Politics axis*.

His areas of specialization are ethics and social and political philosophy. In these areas, he is currently conducting research on social justice, human rights, and the role of the concept of feasibility in moral and political reasoning (including implications for the relationship between "ideal" and "non-ideal theory"). His research and teaching interests also include global justice, distributive justice, democratic theory, contractualist theories in normative ethics, the critical theory tradition of the Frankfurt School, Kant's practical

philosophy, Marxism and socialism, and the history of moral and political philosophy. He has been a H.A. Hart Visiting Fellow at the University of Oxford, a DAAD Fellow at the University of Frankfurt, a Visiting Fellow at the Australian National University, and Laurance S. Rockefeller a Visiting Faculty Fellow at Princeton University's Center for Human Values.



Dominic Martin, Professor of ethics at the École des Sciences de la Gestion of the Université du Québec à Montréal. He has been co-leading the *Ethics and Economy axis* since April 2021. He is also responsible for the flagship theme *Ethics of Artificial Intelligence*, for which he is assisted by Martin Gibert.

His main areas of research cut across business ethics, economic ethics and organizational ethics. He is interested in the question of distributive justice in relation to the moral obligations of organizations in the market, regulatory agencies, and public institutions more generally. He is also interested in the question of our moral obligations in situations of rivalry such as the market,

politics, law or professional sports; and the implications of this adversarial ethic for good governance and corporate ownership structure. His other main area of research focuses on ethical issues related to recent developments in artificial intelligence and the growing use of algorithms.



Christian Nadeau, Professor, Philosophy Department, Université de Montréal. He co-directs the *Ethics and Politics axis*.

He has been a professor in the Department of Philosophy at the Université de Montréal since June 2002, where he teaches the history of ethics and political philosophy. He was also a visiting professor at the École Normale Supérieure de Lyon in March 2005 and at the University of Paris-I Sorbonne in June 2006. He supervises several master's and doctoral students, the latter in co-supervision with French universities. He divides his research into two

broad categories: contemporary political philosophy and the history of political ideas from the Renaissance to the nineteenth century. These two categories also reflect the content of its courses and seminars.

In contemporary political philosophy, her work focuses on issues of transitional justice in the post-war context (reconstruction of institutions, criminal justice and truth and reconciliation commissions, collective memory, etc.), where her main theoretical interests are questions of collective responsibility and democratic deliberation. In general, his research is in line with work on neo-republicanism, whether it is social justice and democracy issues, or my work on immigration. In moral philosophy, he situates his work in the perspective of consequentialism.

His publications in the history of ideas focus on the relationship between political freedom and authority, from the fifteenth century to the nineteenth century, and more specifically on the republican tradition since the Renaissance. With this in mind, he was particularly interested in the works of Machiavelli, Jean Bodin, Hobbes and Rousseau.



Vardit Ravitsky, Professor in the Bioethics Programs in the Department of Social and Preventive Medicine at the School of Public Health of the Université de Montréal. She co-directs the *Ethics and Health* axis.

She is also a member of the Institut de recherche en santé publique de l'Université de Montréal (IRSPUM). She was educated in France, the United States and Israel. After postdoctoral training at the NIH, she held an academic position at the University of Pennsylvania (USA), a Consultant position at Genome Canada and an Advisor position at the Canadian

Institutes of Health Research (CIHR).

Her teaching focuses on clinical ethics and reproductive ethics. Her research interests concern the bioethical issues of medically assisted reproduction and genetics. She is particularly interested in cultural influences on health policy development around bioethical dilemmas.



Mauro Rossi, Professor, Philosophy Department, Université du Québec à Montréal (UQAM). He co-directs the Fundamental Ethics axis.

Before joining UQAM in 2010, he completed a PhD in Philosophy at the London School of Economics in 2009, under the supervision of Richard Bradley, and spent two years (2008-2010) as a postdoctoral fellow at the Centre de Recherche en Éthique de l'Université de Montréal (CRÉUM).

His research interests are in value theory and prudential psychology. More specifically, he is currently working on three projects. 1) Wellbeing and

Happiness (with Christine Tappolet); 2) The Nature and Value of Childhood (with Andrée-Anne Cormier); and 3) The Fitting-Attitude Analysis of Comparative Value.



Natalie Stoljar, Professor, Department of Philosophy, McGill University. She co-directs the *Fundamental Ethics axis*.

Natalie Stoljar came to McGill in 2006 after holding positions at the Australian National University, Monash University (Melbourne) and the University of Melbourne. Her research is in three areas: feminist philosophy, social and political philosophy (especially moral psychology), and the philosophy of law. In feminist philosophy, she has written on feminist metaphysics, especially the notions of essentialism, realism and nominalism. In social and political philosophy, her work focuses on autonomy and other

aspects of moral psychology.

She is co-editor (with Catriona Mackenzie) of the 2000 collection Relational Autonomy. Feminist Perspectives on Autonomy, Agency and the Social Self (OUP). Her current research is funded by a SSHRC Standard Research Grant "Autonomy and Oppression. A Relational Analysis' (2010-13). In the philosophy of law, she has published on the notions of legal interpretation, constitutional interpretation and judicial review, and the methodology of law.



Kristin Voigt, Associate Professor at McGill University, jointly appointed in the Department of Philosophy and the Department of Equity, Ethics and Policy. She co-directs the *Environmental and Animal Ethics axis*.

She received her DPhil in political philosophy from the University of Oxford in 2008, where she completed a dissertation on luck egalitarianism. From 2007-08, she worked as an Assistant Professor at the European College of Liberal Arts (now ECLA-Bard) in Berlin. Subsequently, she held research positions at Harvard University's Program in Ethics and Health (2008-10), Lancaster University, UK (2010-11) and McGill University (2011-12), before

becoming a faculty member at McGill in 2012.

Her research areas include political philosophy, especially egalitarian theories of social and distributive justice, normative aspects of social and health policy, public health ethics, including tobacco control, (childhood) obesity and the use of incentives to improve health outcomes, conceptions and measures of health and health inequality.



Daniel Weinstock, Professor at MgGill University (Faculty of Law), Canada Research Chair in Ethics and Political Philosophy and Pearson Chair in Civil Society and Public Policy. He co-directs the *Ethics and Health axis*.

He is a professor at McGill University (Faculty of Law) and holds the Canada Research Chair in Ethics and Political Philosophy and the Pearson Chair in Civil Society and Public Policy. He founded the Centre de recherche en éthique de l'Université de Montréal (CRÉUM), which he directed for several years. His research interests include governance in a number of types of liberal democracies, including ethical diversity, but also religious and

cultural diversity, political philosophy, and the ethics of public policy.

Flagship Themes Leaders



Yann Allard-Tremblay, Professor of Political Science, McGill University. He leads the *Anti-Racism and Decolonization flagship theme*.

Yann received his PhD from the Universities of St Andrews and Stirling. He previously held an Assistant Professor of Sociology and Political Science at Glendon College, York University. He is a member of the Huron-Wendat Nation.

His current research focuses on the decolonization and indigenization of political thought. In particular, he is interested in how Indigenous political

thoughts, practices, and traditions are transforming various central concepts in political theory. He is also interested in how certain approaches to Western political thought, such as political pluralism and classical conservatism, might allow for a productive exchange with these traditions.



Ryoa Chung, Professor of Philosophy at the Université de Montréal. Coleads the flagship theme *Feminist Ethics*.

Ryoa is co-director of the Center for Research in Ethics (CRE) – with K. Voigt (McGill). She is the recipient of the 2005 FAS Excellence in Teaching Award (Arts and Humanities Sector). She holds a doctoral internship as a foreign research resident at the École Normale Supérieure de Fontenay/St-Cloud (Paris, 1997), completed her doctorate in philosophy at the Université de Montréal (2001) under the supervision of Daniel M. Weinstock and did two research stays as a visiting scholar at Columbia University (2002) and the

Harvard School of Public Health (2003).



Naïma Hamrouni, Professor of Applied Ethics, Political and Feminist Philosophy in the Department of Philosophy and Arts at the Université du Québec à Trois-Rivières. Co-leads the flagship theme *Feminist Ethics*.

She holds the Canada Research Chair in Feminist Ethics on Vulnerability and Structural Injustices and holds a Ph.D. in philosophy from the Université de Louvain and the Université de Montréal (SSHRC J.-A. Bombardier and FRQSC, under the supervision of Daniel Weinstock and Hervé Pourtois), and

a SSHRC postdoctoral fellowship in feminist ethics at Concordia's *Simone de Beauvoir Institute* (under the supervision of Chantal Maillé.

She is interested in structural injustices based on gender, disability, and racialization processes, as well as their expression in various institutional contexts. Her academic publications focus on the sexual and racial division of labour, the ethics of care and vulnerability, and justice issues related to underrepresentation. In particular, she developed the concepts of ordinary vulnerability and institutional androgyny.



Dominic Martin, Professor of Ethics at the School of Management Sciences of the Université du Québec à Montréal. He leads the flagship theme *Ethics of Artificial Intelligence*, for which he is assisted by Martin Gibert.

His main areas of research intersect with business ethics, economic ethics, and political philosophy. PTA is an intervention meant to address equitable distribution of the fruits of research; however, the effectiveness of this instrument has been held at bay by, among other things, a myopic and contractual understanding of it, leaving its application more an exception than the rule in clinical trials. Eu participo como pesquisador na pesuisa liderada por Pandemic Ethics will harness the experiences of

6 LMICs with regard to PTA and epidemics (HIV and Ebola)/pandemics (COVID-19), though HIV and Ebola experiences will be restricted to literature review. The project will heavily capitalize on COVID-19 experience and use it as a springboard for solidarity based national and global agendas. The project will use document review, qualitative methodology, and ethical reflection to address the stated research questions. The project study site will be the 6 LMICs countries i.e., Brazil, India, Kenya, Nepal, Philippines, and Tanzania. These countries have experienced a high prevalence of COVID-19 and have been hosts to COVID-19 trials and such present a perfect ecology for exploring PTA status. Study participants will include key informants such as trial sponsors, research ethics committee members, researchers, policy-makers and regulators, patient group representatives and COVID-19 patients/vaccine recipients/ test recipients.

Johannes Kniess is a Lecturer (Assistant Professor) in Political Philosophy at Newcastle University, UK. Yael Peled is a language ethicist who was a Postdoctoral Research Fellow at the department of socio-cultural diversity at the Max-Planck Institute for the Study of Religious and

Ethnic Diversity, specializing in the ethics, politics and policy of language and linguistic diversity. She holds a DPhil in Politics and International Relations (political theory) from Nuffield College, Oxford, and a BA in Political Science and General Linguistics (Summa cum Laude) from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. Committed to a principled interdisciplinary programme of research, she has held multiple fellowships and appointments in politics and social policy (Hebrew University; the Van Leer Jerusalem Institute; McGill University; the Faber Arts, Sciences and Humanities Residency of Catalonia in Olot), social and political ethics (Université de Montréal; McGill University; KU Leuven; UCLouvain), education (King's College London), medicine (McGill University), HOPOS (Goethe-Universität Frankfurt am Main), and Jewish philosophy (Universität Hamburg). Alongside her primary research focus on the politics of multilingual and multicultural societies in democratic theory, and the moral, social and political philosophy of language, she is also interested in interdisciplinarity in the social sciences and the humanities, and in complexity theory and ethics in public policy research.

During the term of her CRÉ fellowship, Peled carried out her research project "How to Do Things without Words? Moral Agency and the Linguistically-Disrupted Self". Her aim in this project was to investigate how instances of linguistic rupture and distress, which are brought about by profound negative experiences such as trauma and mental illness, impact on individuals' sense of moral agency. In particular, among individuals that already belong to linguistic minority communities (e.g. immigrants, indigenous peoples, Deaf communities), and for whom the very act of communication, and the relational affordances and assurance it secures, can rarely be taken for granted. A core component of the project focused specifically on the question of the philosophical sources and evidential pools of moral knowledge pertinent to this topic and type of inquiry, as part of a broader attempt to position that inquiry in relation to the emerging linguistic justice debate. Key elements of that work continue to inspire and inform Peled's current research projects as well as future research plans.

ART, in its dominant version, includes an egalitarian core commitment, viz. the idea that human and nonhuman animals, qua sentient beings, are moral equals, i.e., are equally morally considerable. Yet, most animal rights theorists also hold a) that when circumstances are dire, there comes a point where humans are permitted to harm animals (in ways they are not permitted to harm humans) and/or b) that there can be what she calls a "morally rectified version of human civilization", where exploitation of nonhuman animals is overcome, but humans do not have to sacrifice a certain standard of living. Her project is concerned with demonstrating that ART's egalitarian core commitment is inconsistent with both a) and b). She is examining the impact recognizing nonhuman animals as subjects of justice has on traditional accounts of justice and its preconditions - she addresses this problem under the working title "The circumstances of interspecies justice", echoing Hume's and Rawls's conception of the conditions in which the standard of justice supposedly becomes applicable in the first place. She has presented elements of the respective stages of this work, inter alia, at the lunch-time talk at the CRÉ and the Transatlantic Workshop in Practical Philosophy. The project is to result in a book and in her time at the CRÉ, she has made most progress on those chapters that identify different versions of the received view that an egalitarian theory of interspecies justice permits of privileging humans in certain situations and that critically examine possible responses to the problem she identifies with this belief.

Aside from advancing her main project, she has gladly accepted an invitation to submit a contribution (review pending) to a special issue of *Les ateliers de l'éthique* on speciesism. Two other papers, one on the concept of interspecies solidarity and one on the concept of science denial, were completed during her stay at the CRÉ and she has continued work on two previously planned papers, addressing the

concept of indirect speciesism and the implications of the moral considerability of animals for the moral entitlements of humans regarding their own education and moral development.

Alon, Ido, Ph.D. (Economics) in 2019, Autonomous University of Madrid. Research project entitled "Mapping ethical, legal, & social implications (ELSI) of assisted reproductive technologies". *Stay from January* 1, 2022, to *December* 31, 2024

Ido Alon, a PhD graduate from the Autonomous University of Madrid with several publications, specializes in the ethical and regulatory aspects of Assisted Reproductive Technologies. His research interests encompass the socioeconomic impacts of medical innovations, with an aim to shape future health economics policies and practices.

His ongoing postdoctoral project involves a comprehensive literature review on the ethical, legal, and social implications of Assisted Reproductive Technologies. It began prior to the arrival to CRÉ by the collection, cleaning and classification of almost 8000 publications in the field. It recently resulted in the publication of two papers. The first paper mapped and examined the geographical distribution and topical focus of research in this field from 1999 to 2019, revealing increased research output and a trend towards geographical decentralization. The second paper mapped and analyzed international research in the field, as a tool to diverse the geographical distribution of research. The papers highlighted the importance of diverse research perspectives, reflecting local cultural, social, and economic contexts. Presently, Alon is working on two additional papers focusing on specific areas within ART.

During his stay at CRÉ, Ido Alon first focused on finalizing the first two papers, working diligently on their discussions and conclusions, ensuring their submission and eventual publication. Secondly, he collaborated with a Master's student at UDEM also supervised by Professor Vardit Ravitsky. Together, they began the process of gathering, mapping, and analyzing materials on two additional fields within Assisted Reproductive Technologies: Preimplantation Genetic Diagnosis and Fertility Preservation. The article centered on Preimplantation Genetic Diagnosis is now nearing completion.

He is a Postdoctoral Fellow at the Department of Philosophy, McGill University, and affiliated with the Centre de recherche en ethique (CRÉ). He earned his PhD in 2019 at Uppsala University, under the supervision of Folke Tersman. Before coming to Montreal, he was a Postdoctoral Researcher at the Institute for Futures Studies, where he is now an Affiliated Researcher in the

project "Climate Ethics and Future Generations".

He works within analytic political philosophy, with a special interest in the philosophy of John Rawls. His dissertation *Reinterpreting Liberal Legitimacy* was an inquiry into how to best understand the Rawlsian liberal principle of legitimacy, according to which political legitimacy requires justifiability to all citizens. In his postdoctoral research project *Extending Liberal Legitimacy*, which is funded by a three-year international postdoc grant from the Swedish Research Council, he continues his work on this topic by exploring the idea that legitimacy requires not only justifiability to all present citizens of a state, but to future citizens and non-citizens as well. This also connects with his previous research on contractualism and justice between generations, carried out at the Institute for Futures Studies.

His research during his stay at the CRÉ has been primarily focused on developing an argument for why political legitimacy requires justifiability to future citizens, and to demonstrate the radical implications of such an extension of the Rawlsian account of political legitimacy. As part of this work, and supported by Professor Iwao Hirose, he organized the workshop "Public Reason and Liberal Legitimacy" on November 18-19 (2022). Closely related to this research on liberal legitimacy and future generations, he has also written a paper on the justification of public reason.

He has presented his work on several occasions during this period. In particular, he presented at the Central APA in Denver and at the Pacific APA in San Francisco. He also served as a commentator at the Eastern APA in Montreal.

Finally, he has been invited to contribute a chapter on Rawls and justice between generations for the *Oxford Handbook on the Philosophy of John Rawls*.

Deane, George, Ph.D. in 2021, University of Edinburgh Research project entitled "Digital Minds Project". *Stay from September 1*, 2022, to May 2024

He is a postdoctoral researcher on the *Digital Minds* project, a collaboration between computer scientists (Yoshua Bengio and his group at MILA), and philosophers (himself, Axel Constant, and Jonathan Simon) at the University of Montreal, and philosophers (Nick Bostrom, Robert Long, Patrick Butlin) at The Future of Humanity Institute at the University of Oxford. Thier aim is to understand the possibility of artificial consciousness and the implications

of consciousness science for understanding artificial general intelligence.

His work with the Digital Minds project has continued in the vein of understanding the relationship between consciousness and cognition. They have developed an information theoretic dynamical systems perspective to account for the richness and ineffability of conscious experience in terms of a high-dimensional state space undergoing compression into working memory (Ji et al, 2023), which they are now building on to give an account of compositionality and language of thought. They have written a large-scale collaborative report that brings together leading philosophers, neuroscientists, and consciousness and AI experts to evaluate the possibility and likelihood of artificial consciousness based on current and near future systems (Butlin et al, 2023).

While the relationship between consciousness, selfhood, and agency has been his central focus over his academic career, his recent work has pivoted to AI safety, specifically in identifying core features of agency in artificial systems. During his PIBBSS fellowship, Giles Howdle and him developed an account of 'auto-intentional 'agency (Deane & Howdle; in preparation), whereby systems that apply the intentional stance to themselves (i.e. make abstract explanations of their own behaviour in order to coordinate with themselves over time) are candidates for more dangerous forms of agency.

Sujaya Dhanvantari was a SSHRC postdoctoral fellow in the Department of Philosophy at McGill University, under the direction of Alia Al-Saji. Her specializations are 20th-century existentialism, phenomenology, and social and political philosophy, especially the writings of Frantz Fanon and Simone de Beauvoir, as well as critical race, decolonial, and feminist philosophies.

Her work revisits the racial and colonial pasts and histories that shape and influence the lived experiences of racialized and colonized peoples in the present.

During her time at CRÉ, she engaged in the following projects: 1) the study of Frantz Fanon's psychiatric writings to develop a critical phenomenological account of intergenerational trauma vis-à-vis racism and colonialism, and 2) a critical reframing of the ontologies and epistemologies of gender along racial and colonial lines with the goal of offering not only a perspective on their political uses in racializing and colonizing projects, but also the possibility of transforming gender from an oppressive tool of colonial and imperial power into a philosophical concept and liberatory political tool of emancipation and decolonization.

In January 2023, she ended her postdoctoral position to accept a contractually limited appointment as Assistant Professor of Philosophy at the University of Guelph. On April 2023, she was an invited

His research lies at the intersection of ethics and the philosophy of mind and cognitive science, with a focus on emotions. He is currently working on a project on the normative force of AI emotional expressions (with Jonas Blatter) and a project on recalcitrant emotions (i.e., emotions that conflict with our considered judgments), as well as developing a larger project on the role of motivational bases (i.e. the desires, preferences, and other

motivational states that shape the emotions we experience) in the rationality and value of emotion. She completed a PhD at the Université du Québec à Montréal, under the supervision of Luc Faucher (UQAM) and Maël Lemoine (Université de Bordeaux). Her doctoral dissertation, entitled "Towards a Socially Constructed and Objective Definition of Mental Disorder", focuses on the objectivity of the concept of mental disorder and the debate surrounding the problem of medicalization in psychiatry. She was then a postdoctoral fellow

(FQRSC) at the Biomedical Ethics Unit of McGill University, under the supervision of Phoebe Friesen, and co-supervised at the École normale supérieure, under the supervision of Stéphanie Ruphy.

Her research interests lie at the intersection of the philosophy and ethics of psychiatry, feminist philosophy of science, and social epistemology. Much of her work questions the revision process of the *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders* (DSM) and its epistemic and ethical presuppositions. She is also interested in epistemic injustices and how they can arise during processes of medicalization and categorization in biomedical psychiatry. Another of her fields of research concerns the different forms of activism in psychiatry and their compatibility with the scientific character of this discipline.

Zoey is currently a SSHRC postdoctoral fellow in the Department of Philosophy at McGill University, co-supervised by Ian Gold and Natalie Stoljar. Beginning January 2024, they will be a postdoctoral researcher at the Centre for Research in Ethics, working on a project titled "A socially situated account of agency in addiction," co-supervised by Ian Gold and Luc Faucher.

I received a Ph.D in Philosophy in 2021 from the CUNY Graduate Center, under the supervision of David Papineau.

They work in philosophy of psychiatry and mental health, as this intersects with philosophy of mind, ethics and feminist philosophy. Their dissertation, *Desire*, *Culture*, and the Body, developed a theory of desire according to which desires are essentially enculturated states that play the role of presenting favourable outcomes that act as inputs to intention formation, and thereby intentional action. The

dissertation included analysis of two paradigmatically bodily desires: desires for psychoactive substances (specifically, addictive desires) and sexual desires.

Their current research takes up questions concerning agency, emotion, desire, experience and self-understanding in the context of psychiatry and mental health. Their postdoctoral project addresses the question of how the social environment, including structural inequality, shapes and is shaped by agency in addiction. They use a 4E cognition framework to explore how psychological states and processes characteristic of addiction are products of dynamic interactions between agents and their environments, with consequences for addiction policy, treatment, and recovery. On the view They are developing, addiction is understood as an agent-environment system. Part of this project will be elaborated in an invited article co-authored with Lucy Osler for a 2024 special issue of *Philosophy, Psychiatry & Psychology* (edited by Michelle Maiese) on addiction and self-insight, and another part in a paper on emotion regulation in addiction, co-authored with Anke Snoek and Froydis Gammelsater. In another paper, they will explore how agency and identity are *experienced* in addiction through an analysis of addiction recovery as a transformative experience.

During their stay at the CRÉ, they have published research introducing foundations for their situated account of addiction in an article, "Affective scaffolding in addiction," in *Inquiry*, and they published a social account of craving in *Aeon* magazine. They presented research at the Canadian Philosophical Association Annual Congress, the Epistemic Injustice and Agency in Psychiatry and Mental Health Workshop, organized by the Canada Research Chair on Epistemic Injustice and Agency, the Southern Society for Philosophy and Psychology Annual Meeting, the McGill Advanced Study Institute on the theme of the Situated Brain – Culture, Context and Ecologies of Mind, and at two Midis de l'éthique du CRÉ. In addition to research activities, they co-organized a workshop on "Radical and critical approaches to understanding and supporting mental health," inviting international early career researchers, and co-hosted a reading group on Mad Studies and Mad activism with Anne-Marie Gagné-Julien. They joined the newly formed Centre de Recherche en Éthique - Philosophy of Mental Health (CRÉ-POMH) group, the Scaffolding the Bad International Working Group, and the Network for Critical Emotion Theory (CET). Before coming to CRÉ, he was a postdoctoral researcher (2020-2023) at the University of Helsinki under the supervision of Antti Kauppinen and Maria Lasonen-Aarnio. Before that, he completed his Ph.D. in 2020 at the University of Pennsylvania under the supervision of Errol Lord. His primary research interests are in moral psychology, metaethics, normative ethics,

environmental ethics, and epistemology. In ethics, his current research focuses on the moral assessment of cognitive and non-cognitive attitudes, the (dis)value of normative deference, the nature of the fittingness relation, and the fittingness conditions of gratitude and resentment. In environmental ethics, his current research focuses on what moral attitudes or emotions it is fitting to have toward nature. In epistemology, his current research focuses on the nature of epistemic blame.

While at CRÉ, he was working on the project "Gratitude and Resentment: A Usefully Opposed Pair" under the supervision of Chris Howard (McGill) and Mauro Rossi (UQÀM). In this project, he developed novel views about when and why gratitude and resentment are fitting or owed to others, as well as raising new puzzles concerning so-called "debts" of gratitude. In "Forgiving Debts of Gratitude," he developed a novel account of what forgiving a debt of gratitude is and then argue against the commonplace that benefactors do not have the power to forgive debts of gratitude. In "The Unity of Gratitude," he argued against the current orthodoxy that gratitude to a person and gratitude for some benefit are distinct emotions. He argues that they are two species of the same genus and they are united to being fitting valuing responses to benefits for which one is not primarily creditworthy. In "The Sin of Ingratitude," he argues that the primary wrong of ingratitude is that it constitutes a kind of objectification of the benefactor. In "Gratitude without Debts" he argues that there are a wide range of mundane cases in which gratitude to a person is fitting, but not owed to anyone. In "Gratitude and Believing in Someone" (w/Mauro Rossi and Christine Tappolet), they argue that we can owe gratitude to those who believe in us against the evidence. In "Resentment without Wronging," he argues that the commonplace that resentment is fitting just in case one is wronged is false.

He recently signed a contract for the edited volume *The Moral Psychology of Resentment* and was invited to submit an article on gratitude for *Philosophy Compass*. His current projects concern the nature and normativity of gratitude. He is working on puzzles concerning so-called "debts" of gratitude as well as makes gratitude fitting vs owed. Most recently, he presented a version of his paper, "Forgiving Debts of Gratitude" at Fudan University in China. Since his stay at CRÉ, he has written drafts of 4 papers: "The Unity of Gratitude," "Forgiving Debts of Gratitude," "The Sin of Ingratitude," and "Gratitude without Debts." He has also presented at MAL (Montréal Affect Lab), midis de l'éthique du CRÉ, and Fudan University in China.

Éliot Litalien received his Ph.D. from the Department of Philosophy at McGill University in 2020. He works primarily in ethics, philosophy of action, and social philosophy. In his doctoral dissertation, he has written about shared agency, cooperation, and cooperativeness. He is now pursuing two research projects that build on his doctoral dissertation. On the one hand, he is bringing his doctoral research to bear on the nature and normative evaluation of complicit behavior, with a particular attention given to complicity with social oppression and structural injustices. On the other hand, he is exploring how agents respond to situations where they have no choice but to do things they'd rather not do—that is, situations where agency is a burden. A grounding assumption behind both projects is that our non-ideal circumstances significantly shape our normative landscape and, accordingly, the way we exercise our agency when navigating this landscape as well as the responsibility we bear when navigating this landscape poorly.

He recently received his Ph.D. at the Department of Philosophy, University of New South Wales, Australia, in November 2021. His dissertation entitled, "Addressing Fragmented Relationships and Dislocation in environmental thinking: Ubuntu Insights on Human and Nonhuman Wellbeing" addressed environmental concerns, focusing on issues of inter-and-intra-species

fragmentation, displacement, and wellbeing.

His research interests are in the area of environmental philosophy, climate and epistemic Justice, sustainability, Black Studies, ethics, race, indigenous knowledge (Western and African philosophy), and cultural heritage. The themes that he is currently interested in and working on include decoloniality, belonging, truth, moral status, justice, agency, sustainability, virtue, and wellbeing.

In the first phase of his stay at CRÉ, he worked on a project entitled "Moral Conversations on Two Accounts of Human-Animal Belongingness: Are Three Two Truths," which he presented on the 21st of February 2023. An unresolved concern in environmental literature is who and what falls within the domain of environmental moral and policy coverage. While the view that humanity counts morally or belong is generally undisputed in the philosophical literature and public policy deliberations, that of nonhumanity is elusive since a lot of beings and entities can be included under such a heading: animals, trees, landscape, rivers, wilderness, and the natural environment. We have seen a need to broaden the prevailing understanding of belonging in Western and non-Western thought. This essay investigates the two approaches to belongingness in the moral community, namely, *sentience and ubuntu-inspired views*. It uses the vocabulary of "belongingness" to refer to the beings and species that deserve moral consideration in our public policy decisions and environmental plans.

Camille Ternier's research is mainly in political philosophy and economic philosophy. After working as part of her thesis on how to democratize corporate governance (published in *Being Free Workers*, 2021), she became interested in how current management methods raise issues for

contemporary egalitarianism, particularly in terms of epistemic justice. Her main research interests are related to economic philosophy, philosophy of work, contemporary political philosophy and the history of economic ideas and practices (*workplace democracy*), cooperativism, Social and Solidarity Economy, economic utopias). She also has an interest in methodological issues concerning interdisciplinarity and field practice when one is a philosopher, as well as in the sociology of production cooperatives (called worker cooperatives in Quebec).

Since January 2023, Camille Ternier has been a postdoctoral researcher at Sciences Po Paris as part of the ANR TheoVail project "La théorie politique au travail. Reconceptualiser l'exploitation, la démocratie et la justice à travers les écrits réflexifs de travailleurs et de travailleuses." Her research consists in analyzing the writings of the first workers of workers' associations (1830-1847) in order to reconstruct their conceptions of equality, democracy and justice at work.

As part of her postdoctoral fellowship at Cré, co-directed in the second year by Christian Nadeau (UdeM) and Pablo Gilabert (Concordia), three research projects were conducted. The first was to elaborate an "internal" critique of contemporary neo-republicanism with regard to its proposals for the organization of the economy. The aim was to encourage the New Republicans to be clearer about their normative proposals with regard to the world of work, as well as to argue in favour of the cooperativist Republican authors.

The second project was to ask whether egalitarians who highlighted the problems of social status inequalities in the world of work were missing out on equally important issues caused by the individualization of work. The internship was an opportunity to confront the ideas of these philosophers with existing work in psychodynamics of work, sociology of work and critical theory. This has resulted in an article (in finalization) "Working as Equals, but Working Alone", where egalitarians are invited to take into account the problems of problematic hierarchies of esteem in the workplace, as well as the phenomena of neglect and indifference.

Finally, the postdoctoral fellowship was an opportunity for a research collaboration with Jules Salamone-Sehr, also a researcher at CRÉ. Their article (in finalization) questions the epistemic nature

of certain injustices experienced by workers, such as when the job they hold does not allow them to make the most of their practical knowledge (*know-how*).

Gender Studies from the University of Angers, she is now preparing a thesis in political science at the Arènes laboratory (UMR 6051) of the University of Rennes. Under the supervision of Christine Guionnet (MCF HDR in Political Science), her work focuses on social movements and collective action, and more particularly on animal activism and activism. In a comparative approach between the French and Quebec configurations, her work is primarily limited to the anti-speciesist movement.

In collaboration with other young researchers in *animal studies*, they set up the CREAMA project (Collectif de recherche en études animales et mouvements animalistes). In addition to internal thematic sessions that aim to equip and discuss their respective research topics, the collective also aims to open up in a more formal way. They are therefore invested in a study day project that should be held at the beginning of 2024. They are also studying the possibility of attaching a dedicated doctoral seminar to the Observatory for Research on the Animal Condition (ORCA).

During her research stay at the CRÉ, she did a large part of her research fieldwork. Since her work is based on a comparative dimension, it was necessary for her to set up a whole ethnographic approach within the most representative anti-speciesist organizations in Quebec. In this sense, she was able to practice more than fifty observations (about 200 hours) in a wide variety of organizations and contexts. To the richness of the material thus collected, she was able to add fifty semi-structured interviews conducted with various profiles of activists. This stay at the CRÉ was therefore the culmination of her investigation since this shift in the focus of the gaze allowed her to invalidate and/or confirm hypotheses that had emerged from her French fieldwork. In addition, the immersion in the CRÉ and the contacts made in this context have greatly contributed to the advancement of her research. In particular, the supervision of Valéry Giroux was an undeniable asset. Their discussions provided her with elements of response and reflection, thus allowing her to arrive at a more detailed understanding of the issues specific to the Quebec configuration of the movement.

Abstract: Dans l'inconscient collectif, lorsque l'on pointe du doigt les traditions patriarcales moyenâgeuses en Afrique, on ne les associe presque jamais aux nombreuses manifestations métastatiques de la langue française en tant que véhicule/catalyseur/vectrice des imaginaires et par conséquent, héritage résiduel en lien direct avec l'institutionnalisation de la domination des corps

Abstract : La bioéthique française a la particularité d'être devenue l'un des éléments clés de la manière dont la France entend se présenter au Monde : une Nation qui promeut les Droits de l'Homme dans

tous les domaines et qui a, grâce au rôle de l'État, la capacité de réglementer la bioéthique dans ses moindres détails, qui ailleurs relèveraient surtout des bonnes pratiques professionnelles. Il s'ensuit que les principes fondamentaux de la bioéthique y sont entendus à la fois comme des principes substantiels liés aux droits de l'homme et comme des principes d'ordre public visant à assurer une gouvernance à visée universelle des questions de bioéthique.



4. Antoine Panaïoti (Toronto Metropolitan University)

Description: A former postdoctoral researcher at CRÉ offered a presentation entitled « Renversement des valeurs épistémiques et « immoralisme » chez Nietzsche et Nāgārjuna ».

Abstract : C'est d'abord et avant tout la « valeur de la vérité » que Nietzsche, dans ses textes tardifs, remettra en question à titre de soi-disant « immoraliste » - une figure qui représente à la fois le plus fin produit et l'adversaire le plus redoutable d'une morale platonique fondée, justement, sur un culte du Vrai. En effet, c'est en tant que pourfendeur infatigable et systématique de la tromperie sous toutes ses formes que Nietzsche dévoile les fondements délusoires sur lesquels repose la dichotomie moralo-

épistémique classique Vrai/Faux, ainsi que le ressentiment et la volonté d'anéantissement qu'elle exprime. Ainsi se réalise l'implosion de l'édifice philosophico-religieux platonico-chrétien sous le poids de ses propres exigences morales, ce qui rendra possible l'émergence de l'éthos perspectiviste. S'il apparaît si important aux yeux de Nietzsche d'opérer un tel renversement des valeurs épistémiques, c'est qu'il craint que la modernité européenne ne bascule dans un « nouveau Bouddhisme européen » caractérisé par un scepticisme abattu. Dans cette conférence, je jette un regard critique sur cet aspect de la philosophie comparée nietzschéenne et défends la thèse selon laquelle le philosophe bouddhiste Nāgārjuna (Ilème siècle) est dans les faits un précurseur de Nietzsche en matière de refonte radicale de l'axiologie épistémique. Je chercherai à montrer que, dans leur lutte « immoraliste » contre la tyrannie du Vrai, Nāgārjuna et Nietzsche sont des alliés dont les programmes philosophiques gagneraient à être hybridés.

5. Balam Kenter (Concordia University)

Description: GRÉEA conference entitled « Rendering Surplus, Rendering Flesh: Capitalism, Animals, and Disability ».

Abstract: The animal rendering industry and surplus populations are two features of capitalism that are both invisibilized as by-products, subject to logics of waste-management and recycling. Shukin's (2009) genealogy of how animal life gets symbolically and carnally rendered capital, demonstrates the central role of animals in the reproduction of capitalist hegemony. Similarly, the paradox of surplus

essential to, and created by, it (Marx, 2000; Endnotes, 2010). 40 percent of the global workforce is currently rendered superfluous (Benanav, 2014). Most of this global surplus population is disabled (WHO, 2011; UN, 2015), showing capitalism to be a disabling power. Appreciating the centrality of rendering and surplus populations necessitates astute attention to the seemingly non-productive and/or non-labour-centric, but no less material, aspects of late capitalism that banks on rendering animal and human bodies as capital, perpetually cannibalizing its own waste, and turning all excess into surplus value. Utilizing insights from Critical Disability Studies and Critical Animal Studies, I offer an interdisciplinary consideration of surplus populations and animal rendering with the aim of better understanding the contradictions of the current phase of capitalism through pathologized and non-laboring bodies, both animal and



6. Colloque «Transcending Settler Colonialism: Decolonization, Reconciliation, and Transformation »

When: May 26-27, 2022

Description: The Cré was a proud partner of the conference held at McGill, which was attended by our members: Didier Zuniga, Catherine Lu, Yann Allard-Tremblay, Ryoa Chung.

This two-day conference brought together Indigenous scholars and non-Indigenous scholars from across Canada, the USA, the UK, Uganda, Finland, and Australia to engage in presentations and discussions of cutting-edge research related to the themes of Indigenous resurgence and resistance; decolonization; reconciliation; and transformation of settler colonialism, as well as other closely

related topics. The conference was funded by the McGill Indigenous Studies and Community Engagement Initiative, the Yan P. Lin Centre for the Study of Freedom and Global Orders in the Ancient and Modern Worlds (Research Group on Global Justice and Research Group on Constitutional Studies), and the Centre de Recherche en Éthique. The conference also involved scholars in the McGill and Montréal communities, including post-doctoral fellows, graduate students, and undergraduate students, as well as the broader public.



7. « Self-Esteem and Social Competition »

When: May 30, 2022

Description: On the occasion of the CRÉ's Ethics Lunchs, Pablo Gilabert gave a presentation entitled "Self-Esteem and Social Competition".

Abstract: This paper explores the relations between self-esteem and social competition. Self-esteem is a very important good and social competition is a widespread phenomenon. They are commonly linked, as people often seek self-esteem through success in competition. Although competition in fact generates valuable consequences and can to some extent foster self-esteem, empirical research suggests that competition has a strong tendency to undermine self-esteem. To be sure, competition is not the

source of all problematic deficits in self-esteem, and it can arise for goods other than self-esteem. But the relation between competition and access to self-esteem is still significant, and it is worth asking how we might foster a desirable distribution of the latter in the face of difficulties created by the former. That is the question addressed in this paper. I identify nine mechanisms that support individuals' self-esteem and impose limits on competition. I offer justifications of these mechanisms through prudential and moral arguments that apply to both interpersonal and sociopolitical contexts. I focus, in particular, on the challenges faced by people in their practices of work. The approach I propose neither recommends self-denial nor the uncritical celebration of the rat race.

12. 6th Social Justice Theory Workshop, 2022

13. « Power and Domination »

When: August 15–17, 2022

Description: Workshop co-organized by the Research Group on Constitutional Studies (RGCS) of the Yan P. Lin Centre, the Groupe de recherche interuniversitaire en philosophie politique de Montréal (GRIPP), the CRÉ and McGill's Department of Philosophy, with the participation of Arash Abizadeh, Dominique Leydet, Éliot Litalien, Pablo Gilabert, William Clare Roberts, Yann Allard-Tremblay, Daniel Marc Weinstock and Ryoa Chung.

This three-day international workshop highlighted new and ongoing work that undertakes substantive inquiry into the scope and dynamics of structures of social power and domination. As the

high tide of Rawlsianism recedes, political theorists and philosophers are devoting renewed attention to a number of concepts that had been central to classical social theory but largely submerged during Rawls's ascendance in political philosophy. New works on domination, social structures, and power have proliferated. In particular, the relational egalitarianism pioneered by Elizabeth Anderson and the neo-republicanism favoured by Philip Pettit and Quentin Skinner have aspired to reorient the focus of political theory away from the distribution of goods and towards social structures constituted by hierarchical relations of social power amongst individuals, whether relations of oppression (emphasized by relational egalitarians) or of domination (the central issue for neo-republicans). This workshop highlighted work analyzing these key concepts.

The workshop occurred over three days. Day one was a workshop on Arash Abizadeh's manuscript on Power, Subjection, and Democracy, elements of which have appeared in recent articles on social power. Day two focused on William Clare Roberts's book manuscript, A Radical Politics of Freedom: Domination, Ideology, and Self-Emancipation. On day three, participants presented papers on key questions and concepts which work to clarify the stakes of competing definitions of power and domination and the implications of focusing our political theorizing on these concepts.

14. Orit Golan (Department of Health Systems, Max Stern Yezreel Valley College & Haifa University in Israel)

Description: Presentation entitled «Fertility treatment during COVID-19 from women's perspectives: A bioethical analysis of the closure of IVF clinics »

Abstract: With the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, and in light of growing uncertainty as to the spread of the virus, health systems around the world shut down or deferred non-urgent/elective medical services. In some countries, this included in vitro fertilization (IVF). This decision had

profound implications for many women, especially those who were over 40, for whom time was of the essence, and for those who were already in the midst of their fertility treatment. In some cases, this even meant the end of their hopes of conceiving. In this study we compare approaches implemented in various countries (US, Canada, UK, and Israel) regarding the closure of IVF clinics. We examine the factors underlying these decisions, such as medical, cultural, and economic considerations. We discuss the similarities in the difficulties encountered by women across countries, despite differences in policies, public funding, and cultural contexts. We suggest adopting a modular approach in cases such as a pandemic crisis, in which fertility care resources become scarcer, by which a patient's age and treatment status are used as factors to determine prioritization. We also argue that decisions regarding closure of IVF clinics are a social litmus test, allowing an examination of socio-cultural values and attitudes regarding the importance of fertility treatments, and even of biological parenthood, in different cultural contexts.



15. « Should Youtube make recommendations for the climate? »

When: September 14, 2022

Description: As part of the CRÉ's ethics lunches, Martin Gibert gave a presentation, in the presence of his collaborators Maxime Lambrecht and Lê Nguyên Hoang.

Abstract: In this paper, we argue that the Youtube algorithm should be programmed to make climate-friendly recommendations. Specifically, we propose that 2% of recommendations (decided by a personalized algorithm) are selected to change people's cognition, motivation, and behavior to address the climate crisis. We rely both on a consequentialist argument and on corporate duties: of moderation, of reparation and of meta-editorial responsibility (comparable to those of a librarian). With 2 billion

users, the Youtube recommender system could be an effective way to militate the climate crisis. We consider different implementation scenarios before examining psychological obstacles, such as the illusion of neutrality or reactance. We then examine the criticisms that such a project may raise: the worry of manipulation, the threat of a slippery slope, and issues of freedom of speech. We conclude that given the severity of the crisis, none of these elements justify not programming Youtube's algorithm in a more climate-friendly way.



16. « Souveraineté, autonomie et fédéralisme multinational / Sovereignty, Autonomy, and Multinational »

Description: International symposium held at the University of Montreal, on September 18–20, 2022. The objective of this conference was to reflect on the concepts of sovereignty, autonomy and federalism in the context of plurinational spaces such as Canada. The three-day conference brought together several internationally renowned researchers who have worked on this issue, including Margaret Moore, Helder De Schutter, Alan Patten, Melissa Williams, Yann Allard-Tremblay and many others. The first day of the conference was devoted to the presentation of the work of doctoral students who are interested in these questions in political philosophy.

19. Stefan Gosepath (Freie Universität Berlin)

Description: Presentation entitled « What, if anything, is wrong with bequest? »

Abstract: This talk is concerned with the question of whether or not it is just that people inherit property. Should an owner, while alive, be entitled to transfer property holdings after their death to a person of their choosing? Is the right to posthumous transfer a part of the right to private property? In this talk, Gosepath defends the thesis that the common social practice of inheritance, embodied in law and institutions, is in fact pro tanto unjust, since it confers an unjust advantage on the beneficiary. To establish this thesis, Gosepath first considers the main arguments against inheritance from a justice perspective, then defends these positions against three of the main normative arguments offered in

favour of inheritance: the right to property objection, the gift objection, and the value of the family objection.



24. « Moral Worth, Skill, and Virtue »

Description : Presentation from our invited researcher David Horst (Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul).

Abstract: Someone acts in a morally worthy way when they deserve credit for doing the morally right thing. But when and why do agents deserve credit for the success involved in doing the right thing? A recently popular view seeks to answer that question by drawing an analogy with creditworthy success in sports, arts, and crafts: just like creditworthy success in, say, chess, piano playing, or carpentry, creditworthy moral success is a matter of getting things right by way of manifesting a

carpentry, creditworthy moral success is a matter of getting things right by way of manifesting a relevant skill. In this paper, I pursue two aims. The first aim is to show that the analogy with skillful action is flawed because it delivers wrong verdicts as to when doing the morally right thing is relevantly non-accidental. The second aim is to lay the groundwork for an alternative account, according to which morally creditworthy action is a matter of manifesting virtue, not skill—a claim that's based on an important, but underappreciated, difference between virtues and skills.



25. « Autonomy, Community, and the Justification of Public Reason »

Description: Emil Andersson gave a presentation as part of the CRÉ's Ethics Lunches.

Abstract: According to the Rawlsian idea of public reason, fundamental political questions should be settled on the basis of reasons that are acceptable to all citizens. Recently, there have been attempts at offering new justifications of this idea. Blain Neufeld has suggested that it is the ideal of political autonomy that justifies public reason, while RJ Leland and Han van Wietmarschen have instead sought to justify the idea by an appeal to the value of a certain kind of political community. In this paper I argue that these two justificatory strategies share structural features that make them vulnerable

to a common problem: that in non-ideal circumstances, these proposed justifications often turn into reasons to oppose, rather than support, public reason. There are, however, alternative ways of conceiving of autonomy and community that may allow us to avoid this problem. These alternative conceptions may, I suggest, provide a more solid foundation for the idea of public reason.

34. « Fanon and Unliveability ».

Abstract: This paper locates the concept of unliveability in a broader history of systemic racism and colonial oppression. I argue that this history is integral for understanding the social structures that elicit pain, illness, and trauma. This paper asks: What is revealed when critiques of racial and colonial oppression are centred in the concept of unliveability? How is intergenerational pain and trauma reflected in the bodily and psychic health of racialized and colonized peoples? By expanding the racial

and colonial categories of unliveability through a reading of Frantz Fanon's 1952 essay, "The North African Syndrome," I propose that the unredressed historical trauma of racialization and colonization structures affectivity for the racialized and colonized subject. My contention is that Fanon offers a theory of pain that advances an understanding of the colonial duration shaping pathological conditions. It also proposes the grounds for a critical therapeutic, specific to the racialized patient. The Fanonian approach, I conclude, is important for addressing experiences of unliveability, which persist within the ontological dimensions of racial and colonial oppression that constitute our colonial and anti-Black world.

Abstract: Artificial intelligence (AI) technologies and their fields of application are among the most debated developments of recent times. Although being widely discussed academically, publicly and in policy debates, certain aspects of their research, development and application are still rather ignored within the 'mainstream' debate, namely the impact AI technologies have on nonhuman animals. The

talk aims, firstly, at introducing the manifold ways in which the research, development as well as application of these technologies impact nonhuman animals. Therefore, it will be broadly differentiated between a) 'Animals for Al', highlighting the ways in which nonhuman animals are utilised to develop Al technologies, and b) 'Al for Animals', discussing Al applications that are used on or for nonhuman animal individuals. Secondly, the ethical challenges that come along with these impacts will be discussed and evaluated. This discussion and evaluation is linked to the larger context of the human-animal relationship. Using the example of so-called speciesist biases in Al, it

is explained to what extent AI technologies have the potential to reproduce existing speciesist assumptions, or, if programmed appropriately, to work against them.


39. « Travailler entre égaux, mais seuls. L'égalitarisme peut-il rendre compte du caractère problématique de la fragmentation sociale au travail ? »

Description: Camille Ternier gave a presentation as part of the CRÉ's Ethics Lunches.

Abstract: D'un point de vue économique, l'entreprise est caractérisée par un mécanisme de coordination (contrairement aux marchés). Pourtant, la fragmentation sociale est un phénomène très répandu en son sein. « La solitude au travail est un vrai problème. (...) Je me sens isolé 45 heures par

semaine », déclare un cadre anonyme dans les colonnes du *Guardian* en 2016. La fragmentation sociale ét la solitude – définie comme l'expérience émotionnelle de l'absence de certains biens sociaux plus enrichissants comme le soutien moral, l'affection et la camaraderie – sont en réalité souvent le résultat de méthodes managériales. C'est ainsi que la théorie critique s'est penchée récemment sur l'évaluation individuelle des performances. Les égalitaristes peuvent-ils fournir des concepts utiles pour rendre compte de ce type de problème ? Certains travaux portant sur les conceptions relationnelles de l'égalité ont pu rendre compte du caractère problématique de la façon dont la division du travail dans la société ou les hiérarchies d'autorité dans les entreprises pouvaient se transformer en hiérarchies de statut. Dans leur continuité, des travaux pourraient sans doute être aisément développés afin de critiquer les effets les plus préoccupants de la mise en compétition des travailleurs entre eux (comme l'apparition de hiérarchies d'estime problématiques, de relations de défiance ou bien la marginalisation et l'exclusion des moins compétitifs). Mais les approches relationnelles de l'égalité sont-elles également aptes à rendre compte de ce qui pose problème dans les phénomènes – répandus dans les entreprises – de négligence envers certains travailleurs, et d'indifférence mutuelle ? En quel sens l'égalitarisme représente-t-il une défense d'un « système de coopération *et d'affiliation* entre égaux » ?

Abstract: I defend a new kind of value theory that represents values not as single numbers or intervals, but as many-dimensional vectors. With vectors, we can elegantly define Chang's concept of parity, deepen Rabinowicz's fitting attitudes account of betterness, and rigorously model failures of transitivity, such as in cases of 'sweetening'. The result is a fresh and flexible framework for the stranger side of ethics, based not on *sui generis* value relations, but the familiar idea of multidimensional value.

42. Michael Cholbi (Université d'Édimbourg)

Description: Presentation entitled "Voting and duties to self". Organized by Denise Celentano.

Abstract: A number of philosophers are normative skeptics about voting, denying both that we have a moral duty to vote and that voting is prudentially rational. Here I explore whether such skepticism can be rebutted (or at least sidestepped) by recasting voting as a self-regarding moral concern. The thesis that we have a duty to ourselves to vote is supported by a broadly Kantian argument resting on the duty to secure for ourselves the conditions of our external freedom. That the duty to vote is a duty to oneself also explains several phenomenological features of voting and accounts for plausible ethical

claims about mandated voting, the importance of being an informed voter, and the conditions for enfranchisement.


44. Miriam McCormick (University of Richmond)

Description: As part of the GRIN workshops, a workshop around Miriam McCormick's (University of Richmond) manuscript *Beliefs as Emotions*. Researchers commented on each of the chapters of the manuscript, including Aude Bandini (UdeM), Sara Stoud (UNCCH) and Natalie Stoljar (McGill).

Abstract: In this work, I argue that beliefs are emotions. As such they contain both cognitive and noncognitive elements. This view helps to solve puzzles in epistemology, the philosophy of mind, philosophy of action, and philosophy of religion. Further, there are clearly ethical components to how we conduct our doxastic lives, and thinking of beliefs as emotions helps us to understand the ethics of belief. Indeed, in Believing Against the Evidence: Agency and the Ethics of Belief (Routledge2015), I suggest that we should think of beliefs as much more like emotions than philosophers tend to. In my new book, I will more fully develop this idea and its implications.



45. Étienne Brown (San José State University in Silicon Valley, California)

When: January 17, 2023

Description: Étienne Brown (San José State University in Silicon Valley, California) presented his new book *Moral Judgment: An Introduction through Anglo-American, German and French Philosophy,* published by Rowman & Littlefield.

Abstract: This book is the first to introduce readers to contemporary philosophical works on moral judgement stemming from France, Germany and the Anglo-American world – many of which remain untranslated. By integrating Kantian and Aristotelian reflections on this subject, the author combines historiography and critical reflection to offer a rich picture of what it means to make good moral

decisions. As both Kantians and Aristotelians argue, moral judgements are ultimately grounded in the normativity of practical identities. Thus, it is by identifying the obligations tied to the multiple dimensions of our identities (e.g., friend, teacher, romantic partner, citizen) that we can ultimately understand how we ought to act. Yet, Aristotle and Kant also remind us that doing so requires the acquisition of moral virtues which allow us to better discern practical reasons in concrete situations.



46. Progress, technology, nature: Life and death in the Valley of Mexico »

Description: Didier Zuniga gave a presentation as part of the CRÉ's Ethics Lunches.

Abstract: Recent debates in the 'history of the Aztecs' scholarship show how work that seems to align with anti-colonial and anti-imperialist objectives can nevertheless reproduce the view that Western science and technology are the primary means to improve human life. This paper exposes how domination and colonization are not accidental by-products of Western understandings and practices of 'progress' and 'development'; rather, they are inherent to them. I argue that judging Mesoamerican worlds from the modern standpoint of 'progress' rests on flawed assumptions about 'nature' as self-

evident, from which complete and unequivocal knowledge can be acquired linearly and neutrally. I contend that, in order to understand, compare, and contrast the technological differences between Mesoamericans and early-modern Spaniards, we must attend to the different ontological configurations that undergird their respective sociocultural renderings of 'nature'.

49. Stephanie Eccles (PhD student at Concordia University)

Stephanie Eccles, PhD student at Concordia University, « Making Animal Waste Essential: 'Renewing' Animal Agriculture through the Fraught Politics of Renewable Natural Gas Development ». The talk will be followed by a commentary by Jan Dutkiewicz.

Abstract: Stephanie's research engages with political economy/ecology focusing on the links between energy and food systems, Discard Studies, and multispecies relations. Her dissertation research looks at how industrial animal agricultural waste is produced, managed, and turned into frontiers for capital,

in particular for renewable energy projects, at two temporalities: the ordinary day and during disasters. Exploring issues of environmental (in)justice, extreme weather events in North Carolina and British Columbia, and the emerging industry for waste-to-energy projects in North Carolina, she grapples with the enduring waste problems produced by industrial animal agriculture and the proposed socio-ecological fixes. Stephanie conducts multispecies fieldwork that grounds practices of care. Her work is grounded on the broader political projects of transforming how we relate to each other and the nonhuman animal world to work towards a future that is abundantly just and kind.

52. « Liberal Legitimacy and Future Citizens »

Abstract: If the legitimate exercise of political power requires justifiability to all citizens, as John Rawls's influential Liberal Principle of Legitimacy states, then what should we say about the legitimacy of actions that have a significant impact on the interests of future citizens? Prima facie, it appears plausible to demand that such actions, in order to be legitimate, should be justifiable to these future citizens. Surprisingly, this possibility has been overlooked in the literature. In this paper I address this neglected issue, and explore how Rawls's principle can take future citizens into account.

I identify two serious problems for the currently dominant interpretation of the principle, and suggest a revision of the view that would make it better equipped to account for the insight that future citizens matter for political legitimacy.

59. « The dire circumstances of interspecies justice »

When: March 7, 2023

Description: Frauke Albersmeier gave a presentation as part of the CRÉ's Ethics Lunches. ».

Abstract: The idea of the "circumstances of justice" concerns the conditions in which justice becomes attainable and, therefore, duties of justice arise. A mere moderate scarcity of resources is one of these conditions: a limited, yet in principle sufficient supply of critical resources makes efforts for justice necessary, but also makes it possible that everyone will receive "their due." The idea of the circumstances of justice originated in anthropocentric traditions of theorizing justice. Lately, proponents of theories of interspecies justice have appealed to it in an effort, inter alia, to distinguish situations in which humans are under certain obligations towards nonhuman animals from those in which such obligations cease to exist

situations in which humans are under certain obligations towards nonhuman animals from those in which such obligations cease to exist – because conditions are just too dire. However, recognizing nonhuman animals as subjects of justice raises new problems with the way the supposed preconditions of justice are construed in the first place and about their role for delimiting the scope of justice. With a radically expanded set of individuals who are owed consideration in matters of justice, circumstances frequently appear to be dire rather than conducive to allocating to everyone their "fair share." While this should imply that justice is, in some sense, impossible in many scenarios, theories of interspecies justice routinely start from the idea that justice applies at least among humans as well as among humans and some nonhuman animals. The question arises whether these claims can be based on nonspeciesist ways of dividing up the moral community (a question which assumes that the so-called circumstances of justice are at least not the circumstances of justifiability). And what would the implications be for the project of (interspecies) justice if this could not be done?

60. « Can Borders Be Feminist? »

When: March 9, 2023

Description: Amy Reed-Sandoval gave a presentation as part of the CRÉ's Ethics Lunches.

Abstract: This paper explores the following question: can borders be feminist? I argue, first, that many borders are understood, constructed, and violently enforced as "public" and colonial institutions. Such visions of borders, I argue, preclude them from being feminist and otherwise undermine social justice at borders. I go on to argue, however, that we need not accept a theory of borders that is based upon the public/private dichotomy to which feminist political theorists have long objected. We can, instead, consider alternative visions of borders—such as those associated with certain feminist and Indigenous

bordering practices—and then put them to the service of feminist, decolonial, and humanitarian objectives. Finally, I explore two additional questions: (1) why would we want a feminist theory of borders in the first place? and (2) what should we want from a feminist theory of borders?

Abstract: In this paper, I analyze how punitivist subjectivities are produced through the interaction of human and non-human animals in the context of animal abuse in Mexico. I argue that punitivist subjectivities are generated and reinforced through the legal and social defense of abused animals. Taking as a starting point the idea of punitivist populism, I look at how ideas of interspecies justice are

generated as a result of the fantasy of punitivism.

64. « The Unity of Gratitude »

When: March 21, 2023

Description: Max Lewis gave a presentation as part of the CRÉ's Ethics Lunches.

Abstract: Gratitude has two faces. One face of gratitude is interpersonal: we are grateful to someone for something they did. The other face of gratitude is decidedly not interpersonal. In such cases, we are grateful for something, but not to anyone (e.g., we are grateful for an important opportunity or for our own existence). Call these two faces of gratitude personal and impersonal, respectively. How are these two emotions related? The current orthodoxy is that they are distinct emotions (or that impersonal gratitude is misplaced personal gratitude). I provide a novel account of what unifies these

two forms of gratitude and distinguishes them from related attitudes and emotions (e.g., gladness, relief, and appreciation). On the account I develop, your being grateful to someone or for something consists in your valuing someone/something because you see them as bearing an important relationship to something you see as being good-relative-to-you and such that you are not primarily creditworthy for producing or maintaining it.



65. Frédérick Bruneault (UQAM/Collège André Laurendeau)

Abstract: Les récents développements en intelligence artificielle (IA) ont contribué à l'émergence d'une nouvelle forme d'éthique appliquée qu'on peut nommer (sans grande originalité) l'éthique de l'IA. Luciano Floridi suggère que cette éthique appliquée nous invite (ou nous contraint) à repenser non seulement l'application des grands cadres classiques en théorie éthique (éthique des vertus,

déontologisme et conséquentialisme), mais la pertinence de ces approches théoriques elles-mêmes. 67. Brian Lucas (professeur adjoint à l'ILR School, Cornell University)

When: March 27, 2023

Description: Organized by Celia Chui and Dominic Martin, presentation entitled « Intergenerational Hypocrisy: When an Organization's Past Limits its Legitimacy to Act in the Present ».

Abstract: People are considered hypocrites when they fail to practice what they preach. In the current research we explore whether organizations are held to similar standards across generations of leadership. We predicted that an organization's words and deeds are perceived as hypocritical when they are inconsistent with those in the organization's distant past. Further, we predicted that perceived

hypocrisy would reduce the perceived legitimacy of the organization's present actions. Across four studies (total N = 3,349), an organization was perceived as hypocritical when its words or deeds (e.g., requesting debt relief in the present day) were inconsistent with those of the organization's past leadership (e.g. opposing debt relief 60 years prior). We found that perceptions of intergenerational hypocrisy decrease the perceived legitimacy of the organization's present-day actions (Studies 1-3) and increase protest intentions against the organization (Study 2). We also explore boundary conditions to attenuate the effect (Study 4). This research broadens the scope of hypocrisy research by exploring hypocrisy as a group-level phenomenon across generations of leadership, advances research on the perception of organizations, and suggests when and why an organization's present-day actions might be tethered to its past.

68. Garret Cullity (Australian National University)

GRIN

When: March 27, 2023

Description: Presentation entitled "Reasons-Responsiveness and Morality", as part of the GRIN workshops.

Abstract: An attractive way to conceive of morally good motivation and action is as proper responsiveness to morally relevant reasons. A kind person sees the helpfulness of an action as counting in its favour, and an honest person sees the deceptiveness of an action as counting against it, in the same sense of "counting in favour" or "against" that an action's being pleasant or painful to you yourself counts for or against it. Supporting this view requires showing that it makes good overall

sense of the structure of moral thought and experience. It also needs to be supported by an account of what it is to be responsive to reasons—an account that is broad enough to accommodate the kinds of moral goodness that we find in cases of innocent error, fluency, inarticulacy, and akrasia. In this talk, I set out an account of responsiveness to reasons that encompasses these four kinds of cases, then draw out some other helpful implications of this account.

Peut-on répondre aux philosophes et aux politistes qui soutiennent que la nation est la condition sine qua non de la démocratie, le seul lieu d'exercice possible des droits politiques, le terreau de la liberté, de l'égalité et de la fraternité ? 70. « Think Pragmatically: Investigators' Obligations to Patien-Subjects When Research is Embedded in Care », by Stephanie Morain & Emily Largent

When: April 3, 2023

Description : Organized by Charles Dupras, discussion of the *Journal club de bioéthique*.

Abstract: Growing interest in embedded research approaches—where research is incorporated into clinical care—has spurred numerous studies to generate knowledge relevant to the real-world needs of patients and other stakeholders. However, it also has presented ethical challenges. An emerging challenge is how to understand the nature and extent of investigators' obligations to patient-subjects.

Prior scholarship on investigator duties has generally been grounded upon the premise that research and clinical care are distinct activities, bearing distinct duties. Yet this premise—and its corresponding implications—are challenged when research and clinical care are deliberately integrated. After presenting three case studies from recent pragmatic clinical trials, we identify six differences between explanatory trials and embedded research that limit the application of existing scholarship for ascertaining investigator duties. We suggest that these limitations indicate a need to account for the implications of usual care and to move beyond a narrow focus on the investigator-subject dyad, one that better reflects the team- and institution-based nature of contemporary health systems.

Abstract : Alors qu'au début de l'année 2020 nos sociétés se confinaient progressivement pour freiner la diffusion de la pandémie de COVID-19, le rôle du web et des plateformes numériques dans le

maintien de nos relations sociales, professionnelles s'est accru de manière exponentielle tout comme leur usage comme fenêtre, ou ceilleton, sur notre environnement social, politique, économique et informationnel. Cette communication porte sur le rôle de Twitter dans la fabrique et la diffusion du discours opposé aux mesures sanitaires dans la province du Québec, durant les premiers jours de la pandémie de COVID-19, en 2020. Reposant sur une approche hybride qui intègre extraction de données sur Twitter et stratégie de recherche qualitative, et fondée sur une approche sociotechnique inspirée de la théorie de l'acteur-réseau, elle dévoile une archéologie numérique des récits opposés aux mesures sanitaires qui ont circulé dans la twittosphère québécoise durant les deux premières semaines d'application des mesures restrictives imposées par les autorités fédérale et provinciale. En particulier, nous montrons que la fabrique et la diffusion d'un discours opposé à ces mesures aboutissent à un syncrétisme idéologique aux contours flous qui contribue à banaliser les idées traditionnellement associées au conspirationnisme et qui visent les élites scientifiques, culturelles et politiques canadiennes. L'étude, tant du discours que du dispositif qui le promeut, montre par ailleurs qu'il permet à des individus situés à la marge de la sphère publique de se transformer en influenceurs populaires et émerger comme figures de proue d'une mouvance opposée aux mesures sanitaires.
